How it works:

Each year, the winning entries from each of 106 district contests from Guam to Maine gather to compete in the Grand Nationals – approximately 250 entries in each event. After six preliminary rounds in Speech, the top 60 entries in each speech event advance to Octofinals, with cuts to 30 (Quarterfinals), 14 (Semifinals), and 6 (Finals) after that. Congress cuts to Semifinals and Finals in a similar fashion. Students eliminated before Quarterfinals can compete in Supplemental events (Com, Expos, Extemp Debate, Poe, Pro); any student eliminated before Thursday morning can compete in Consolation events (Imp, Story).
